Catch and Release

I just finished reading the book *Same Kind of Different as Me* by Ron Hall and Denver Moore. It is the true story of the unlikely friendship between a homeless man and an international art dealer. One encounter between them particularly struck me. As these two men are getting to know each other the art dealer, Ron, asks the homeless man, Denver, if they can be friends. Denver pauses and begins discussing fishing and what it means to catch and release. He says,

"I just can't figure it out. 'Cause when colored folks go fishin, we really proud of what we catch, and we take it and show it off to everybody that'll look. Then we eat what we catch... in other words, we use it to *sustain* us. So it really bothers me that white folks would go to all that trouble to catch a fish, then when they done caught it, just throw it back in the water... So, Mr. Ron, it occurred to me: If you is fishin for a friend you just gon' catch and release, then I ain't got no desire to be your friend... but if you is looking for a *real* friend, then I'll be one. Forever."

Some people fear that God engages in catch and release with us. God may be wonderful for a time with us. We are good friends, but then life gets rough. Things may happen which make us feel that God is far away. We may think that God must have abandoned us, leaving us to suffer on our own. But the story of Easter tells us something different: God is with us for the long haul. Jesus is faithful to us even to a death on the cross, and brings us through to new and resurrected life in him. We may doubt, or suffer, or be angry, or want to give up on God. We may even feel we are too sinful and "bad" for God to care about us, but the Almighty never gives up on us. We are loved. And God's love is to encourage the fainthearted, console the grieving, guide those who are lost, and support all who suffer. In our pain we may miss God's presence, but it is there. The

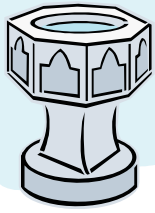

We believe in democracy and transparency. This is your vestry. These are your elected representatives. If you have a question or a concern about the church, you may ask me, the wardens, or any member of the vestry. If you have a matter which cannot be addressed by only one of us and you wish to bring it up to the entire vestry, you may do so. We request that new agenda items be submitted at least one week before the vestry meeting. Vestry meetings, generally, are the second Sunday of the month immediately after church. There is no meeting in July. The members of the Vestry are listed every month on the front cover of the Apostle.

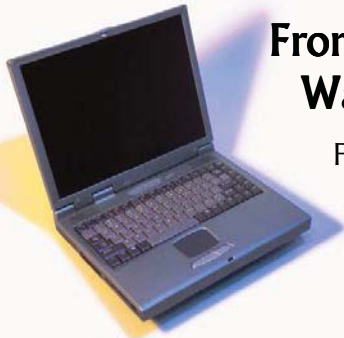

Paul's was very

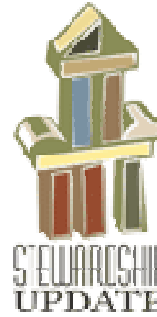
busy, quite exciting, and powerfully moving. There was a different look and feel to the services during Holy week. Certainly, there was something for everyone.

I asked one of our parishioners, who wants to remain anonymous, to write a short article on tithing. This what she wrote:

We were a young, married couple with two children and almost no money in the bank when my husband lost his job. Unemployment checks would be our only financial income. So, naturally, one of our first thoughts was should we stop tithing? After all, we were in serious monetary crisis. Although the decision was to continue to honor our tithe, there were real concerns about how it would be possible to do so. (I remember not wanting to go to coffee hour after church because I did not even have an extra quarter to pay for coffee.) Fortunately our families were very good to us and that was truly a blessing. After eight months, my husband finally got the job he wanted. Then even more blessings came to us! His salary was bigger than at his last job. The company paid for all of our moving expenses. Instead of living in a four-room apartment with no yard, we moved into a six-room duplex with a nice yard for the children to play in and for much less rent than before. The company gave my husband an automobile so now we had two cars. We never owned our own refrigerator, washing machine or

dryer. We were able to buy all three of them as soon as we found a place to live. Within a year of being employed again, we had more money in the bank than we had when my husband lost his job. (Although this had been a difficult time for us, our marriage grew stronger and we became better people for having had this hardship.) People say that you can't out give God. We know that is true...very true.

I thank the author and ask others with similar stories of faith consider also sharing with the members of St. Paul's. I'll always honor your anonymity. Just let me know! Dave

Finance Committee News

A summary of the income and expense for the year thus far appears below. The report indicates that the expenses exceeded income in March by about \$6,630.

For the first three months we paid out almost \$20,000 more than we received in revenue. The leadership of the parish is continually looking for ways to bring revenue and expense more "in line". The Finance Committee will be meeting to review the first quarter in detail. We welcome your ideas and your prayers.

We are very grateful for those of you have been able to pay your pledges so promptly. As the summer months approach, cash flow is so critical...we truly appreciate continuing payments of pledges.

The economy still overshadows much of our thinking and planning. Our investments are not rebounding like we had hoped, jobs are still scarce, and finances are stretched. We are not able to do as much as we would like to do. St. Paul's, however, remains a strong, caring community. St. Paul's will continue to be a place for worship, hope, love and concern.

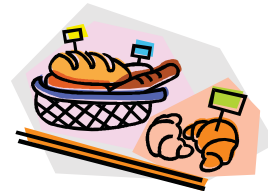

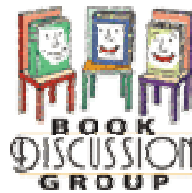
Episcopal Church Women

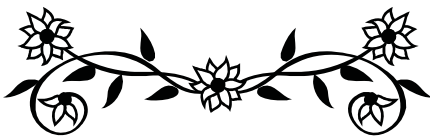
